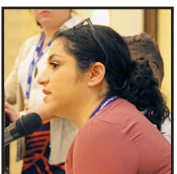
DISCUSSION LEADERS



Merrie Najimy has taught kindergarten for 23 years. In her current capacity as president of the Massachusetts Teachers Association, Merrie talks with thousands of educators a year about what they want for their students and their schools and can provide these valuable insights to inform our search for a superintendent who truly values educators and inspiring teaching.



Jack Schneider is assistant professor of Leadership in Education at the University of Massachusetts-Lowell. As director of research for the Massachusetts Consortium for Innovative Education Assessment, he helps school districts and communities move beyond the use of test scores to assess success and define what they see as quality schooling.
